### **Impact of child abuse:**

The way the affected child interacts with them causes trauma for other kids, families, and society as a whole. Victims of child maltreatment are more susceptible to mental health stress as adults. Over 24 million incidences of online child sexual assault are believed to have been recorded in India between 2017 and 20; 81% of the victims were girls under the age of 14. According to research on child abuse in India done in 2007 by the Ministry of Women and Child Development (GOI), young children between the ages of 5 and 12 are most at risk of abuse and exploitation. This entails abuse on all fronts – physical, sexual, and psychological. It begins with the definition of "child" in Indian law, which has been used in various enactments to denote kinship, cap, and extraordinary insurance. Physical harm (such as blows to the head or body, violent shaking, burns from boiling water or suffocation), as well as a lack of respect for one's health, may have a negative influence on one's ability to improve their physical condition (e.g., insufficient nourishment, absence of sufficient engine incitement, or retaining clinical medicine). Along with certain more general medical concerns connected to abuse, the following sections focus on the more direct physiological effects of child maltreatment, particularly as they pertain to the early mental health of new-born infants.
